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Superintendent's Remarks

West Burlington Independent School District is busy preparing for the 2011-2012 school year. I thought it best to provide some reminders and updates as we make these preparations.

I am asking for more public input on next year's school district calendar. I ask any interested district patrons to come to the administration office located at 607 Ramsey St. on April 4th from 4:00PM to 5:00PM to provide input and discuss next year's calendar. I will have a few drafts of possible calendars prepared at that time. I am planning to ask for Board approval of the calendar on April 18th.

If you have a child who will be attending kindergarten next year, make sure you contact the Elementary office immediately. West Burlington Schools is carefully monitoring our kindergarten numbers. A solid student count makes our planning more efficient and more effective. We carefully monitor all class sizes to ensure personal and quality instruction for all of our students at West Burlington.

Our eight-classroom addition is progressing nicely. It will be ready to go as we open our doors next August. The project is working out very well. We are also planning to enhance security at both sites with additional surveillance equipment, including a "buzz in" system which will give us the ability to better monitor visitors to our buildings. The West Burlington Board is also pleased to say we are making plans to have all of our classrooms air-conditioned for the start of school next fall. This will be a huge asset for our students and staff.

We are working on a transition plan for students coming into sixth and seventh grade. The administration and staff recognize the importance of providing the needed support system for the two grades transitioning into our junior high school. If you have questions or concerns, please contact the principals or superintendent Schmitt. We are here to help.

The Board has approved over \$200,000 in expenditure reductions for next school year. We are confident that none of these reductions will negatively impact teaching/learning in our classrooms. We are developing restructuring plans to continue offering top rate instruction to all of our children. A significant portion of the budget reductions are achieved through attrition and restructuring. The Board will hold its annual budget hearing on April 11, 2011 in the boardroom. All indications show we can lower the overall levy by \$.50, yet increase our cash reserve to put ourselves into a

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better cash position. The budget cuts will obviously be an integral part of our 2011-2012 budget planning.

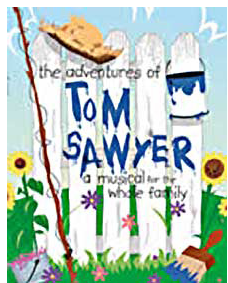
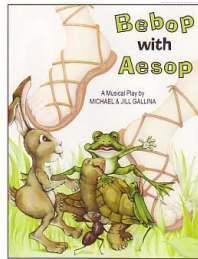

News from the Fourth Grade

We have had a very busy school year! Each teacher had a community volunteer come to the classroom and provide learning through a program called Junior Achievement.



Junior Achievement extends our learning through Social Studies skills.

Mrs. Mueller has also provided several opportunities for us to extend our learning in Science. Our most recent visit from her involved learning about the different types of animals and what they eat – omnivores, herbivores, and carnivores. Students then got to observe different animal skulls to determine what type of animal they were. The students really enjoyed studying the different skulls – they had to look at their teeth to help them decide in which group they belonged.

4th grade divides the classes up for Math and depending on how the students perform on a pre-test for a chapter determines which teacher that student will have to learn the objectives. The students have enjoyed being able to “change” classrooms for Math and learn from others.



We are enjoying our MDPs (Meaningful Distributed Practice) that we do daily from a new resource the teachers received this year. This new resource is called Think Tank from Origo Math. This is a math problem and each day can cover a different objective.

There have been fraction problems, story problems, and number sense problems as some examples.

This is the first year for these students to take MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) tests. This is new to the district this year. In the past we have taken tests called ICAMs (Iowa Collaborative Assessment Modules). MAP tests are completely computerized and the test the student takes is built for them depending on how they answer each question. The students took 3 tests covering Math, Reading, and Science. The teachers shared these results during spring conferences.

The teachers have learned a lot through going to listen to Doug Fisher, and the various days of meeting with specialists from the Area Education Agency (AEA) to learn about the gradual release of responsibility, reading, writing, and math strategies and tips.

As this is being written we are in the middle of taking the ITBS tests. The results for these tests should reach parents later yet this year.

All classes will be doing a state research paper. We spend time researching through books and start by taking notes on note cards. Students then transfer notes to an outline to help them get better organized for writing their paper. After the outline comes the paper. Depending on how much time each student has they work on a poster to add visual representation of their state to share when he/she reads their report to the rest of the class. ✂

Please note...all 9th grade students and kindergarten students are required by state law to have a dental screening done. If you have a 8th grade or upcoming kindergarten student please ask the dentist when they go over the summer to sign the "certificate of dental screening" and either send up to the school or fax to us at 758-6768.

If you have a present 9th or kindergartner and have not turned in the sheet yet please do so ASAP.

Continue to encourage your child to wash their hands often and cover their mouths when coughing. The flu bugs are still going around. Keep them home with a fever above 100. Do not give fever medications and send them to school sick. Remember they need to go 24 hours fever-free before returning to school. They will usually have a fever 4 hours later and then have to be sent home and exposing the rest of the classes with whatever they have. If they are vomiting please wait at least 12 hours before returning them to school.

Elementary Band

The 4th grade students will be trying out the instruments during the month of March. A paper with the recommended instrument for your child will be sent home to you. The instrumental band night is to be scheduled for a Tuesday night in April. This is when you and your child will be able to check into renting the instrument that he/she will be working on during summer lessons.

This year West Music will be here to help in the rental department. Please check with the elementary band director before purchasing an instrument from any other source. If you have an instrument to sell or that you want your child to use, please bring it to school on the designated instrumental night. This way a regular instrumental repair person can look it over to recommend what may need to be done to get it in to good working order.

Remember that as you think about your child playing an instrument, that music increases a student's learning capabilities in many other areas, as various studies show. In 1987-1989, students taking music courses scored an average of 20 to 40 points higher on both verbal and math portions of the AST's than students who took no music courses. They also found that students who participate in their school band or orchestra are 52% more likely to go on to college and graduate..

Sixth grade band parents are encouraged to consider sending their child to the week long summer band camp at Western Illinois University. This is usually the third week of June. The camp is expensive, but there are \$150 scholarships available from Treble Clef Club.. You have to apply for these scholarships before the April 22nd dead line. The forms should be sent to Virginia Garnjobst, 605 North Seventh Street, Burlington, Iowa 52601. Scholarship forms are in my office. We have had a number of our previous band students attend the band camp and they have been so excited about it that they have returned to camp the next year.

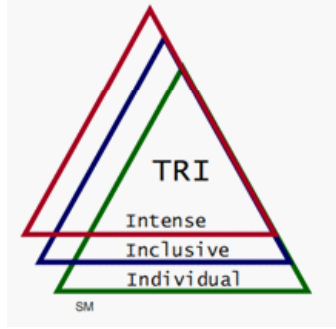

The West Burlington TRI Project

The West Burlington Autism Project has changed its name to the West Burlington TRI Project. The TRI Project provides opportunities for West Burlington students with high functioning Autism Spectrum Disorders (ASDs) to further develop their social skills. Through lunch bunches, before-and after-school groups, and assistance during the day in classes and recess, students in the project have opportunities to practice targeted social skills with their peers.



Additionally, the TRI Project hosts a bimonthly parent support group. This is an opportunity for parents, other family members, and friends to share concerns and successes regarding their loved ones with ASDs. The parent support group is open to anyone in the greater Burlington/West Burlington area who would like to share their experiences. Our next meeting will be held at the West Burlington Elementary School on Thursday, May 12, from 5:30PM to 7:00PM.

TRI represents the three principles, or the three “I”s, of the program: individuality, inclusivity, and intensity. Each student’s social skills instruction is based on his/her individual needs, as determined by parents and school staff. Inclusivity occurs because often the best social models for students with ASDs are their peers. These peers are invited to serve as role models by participating in lunches, recess games, and groups before or after school. Services for the students in the project are provided throughout, and beyond, the regular school day in classroom and social settings. This intensity in programming provides them with repeated opportunities to learn about, practice, and receive feedback on their use of social skills in a variety of social situations.



Because social skills instruction is an on-going need for many students with ASDs, a summer day camp is offered to students currently enrolled in the TRI Project. Together, students with ASD and a small group of their typical peers participate in

a six-week long Giggle Camp. This year the themes are Pirates and Star Wars; throughout the day the 20 students attending will be involved in art, drama, science and building, social skills, and team building activities revolving around the two themes.

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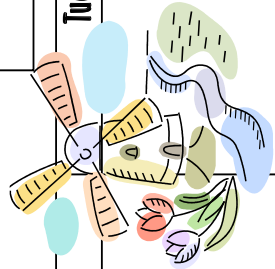
